For us. 00:04:38 Joe So yeah, it's definitely been. 00:04:39 Dewayne Word is a little bit older. 00:04:41 Dewayne Than me, yeah. 00:04:44 Dewayne Just a little bit. 00:04:44 Joe Something still really basically, basically coming up on 40 years old and it's still. 00:04:50 Joe You know the go to, you know tool for producing so many. 00:04:56 Joe I mean, I I can only imagine the number of. 00:04:59 Joe Product papers that have been written. 00:05:01 Dewayne Or books, novels, books. 00:05:03 Dewayne You know, novels. 00:05:05 Joe Scripts, you know, just tons and tons of amazing things that have done with it. 00:05:10 Joe And we're going to hear today, I'm sure about just new, new features added to it, you know and taking it beyond almost just a word processor, but something you can incorporate in some of your business processes process. 00:05:23 Dewayne

We're a word processor. 00:05:25 Dewayne Think about this. 00:05:26 Dewayne A word processor that is older than the Internet itself. 00:05:36 Joe And now, well, now a lot of the new, you know, features are released just on the Internet version of it. 00:05:42 Joe You know, on on the web. 00:05:44 Dewayne Yeah, yeah. 00:05:45 Dewayne I hope we get into that. 00:05:46 Joe Long way from a floppy disk. 00:05:47 Dewayne Yeah, no sneakernet here. 00:05:53 Dewayne Yeah, I hope we get into that. I, I know we we often tell our users when we start educating them on Office 365, we say like you want to start at office.com and that's usually an eye opening experience because they don't realize all the apps that are up there. 00:06:12 Dewayne You know, say up there like in the cloud and word, word being one of them. 00:06:16 Dewayne And there's definitely some differences and I think Ali is probably going to educate us a little bit on what some of those differences are. 00:06:23 Dewayne So and there's some. 00:06:25 Dewayne

Some things that are web only, there are some things that are desktop only.

And you know, there's advantages and situations where you might want to use one versus the other.

I think Joe and I are probably going to start off by giving a gigantic thank you to you for bringing us over to the dark side totally.

I I'm seeing some new stuff in Word online now that I wasn't seeing just a little while ago and and that's dark mode and I'm my eyes. 00:07:57 Dewayne Thank you. 00:07:58 Ali Yeah, dark red has been one of my favorite features to work on. 00:08:01 Ali I started working on dark mode. 00:08:04 Ali Probably two years ago. 00:08:05 Ali Now, and originally we were working on the product for the desktop apps. 00:08:12 Ali So we had dark mode added to Windows and Mac and then you know, it was such a great hit with users. 00:08:18 Ali We thought, you know, we need to add this everywhere else, so you know, as you guys have noticed. 00:08:23 Ali Word Web is now rolling out dark mode as well. 00:08:26 Ali And you know with dark mode you get both the dark ribbon, so all of your menu controls are dark and then also your page color flips. 00:08:33 Ali And we actually kind of flip some of the colors to make things easier on your eyes. 00:08:36 Ali There's less. 00:08:37 Ali Eyestrain, you know, it's easier to. 00:08:38 Ali

Work at night.

00:08:39 Ali

Potentially your battery is even being saved in your computer without producing as much.

00:08:44 Ali

White pixels and I also just think it looks really cool.

00:08:47 Ali

So I love using dark.

00:08:49 Dewayne

It is.

00:08:50 Dewayne

It is a really good.

00:08:52 Dewayne

It's a really good thing.

00:08:54 Dewayne

I run most everything I have in dark mode.

00:08:59 Dewayne

Except sometimes, oddly enough, not teams.

00:09:02 Dewayne

And the reason why I don't run teams in dark mode a lot of times is because I am taking a lot of screenshots or doing a lot of demos and I feel like.

There's not as much.

00:09:13 Dewayne

I don't have any data to prove this point, but I feel like a lot of our people aren't seeing teams in dark mode, so I try to demo it how I feel like they might be.

Do me again.

But I'm definitely team dark mode for sure. I'm pretty sure I mean Joe's background right now. I know our listeners can't see it, but he's in dark mode.

Right.

With the new Windows release, we also have you know, dark mode at the operating system level and then that's something we're trying to inherit as an app as well to just make you opt into dark mode once and then everything should just.

Be part of that dark mode.

That's cool. Yeah. Well.

00:09:48 Joe

Dwayne will give me a hard time with being a night owl, so I'm definitely dark mode happy.

And having been usually on insider builds of systems and office, I've been happy with dark mode for quite a while now, taking advantage of that.

So it's been great.

00:10:05 Joe

I've had a uh.

00:10:06 Joe

It's funny, I had a memory coming back of a faculty member who I had to switch over from a product called Word Perfect Way back in the day.

And we had to get a blue background situated because that was really, really popular and happy anyways.

Just a really old memory of switching word and making it right for the user.

00:10:28 Ali

Yeah, that's actually another reason why I love working on dark mode.

00:10:31 Ali

A big part of my job on word is actually managing accessibility.

00:10:35 Ali

For the product.

00:10:36 Ali

And dark mode, although like every person thinks it's super cool, it actually falls under an accessibility feature category.

00:10:44 Ali

While we're reducing the light put output of your screen and kind of reducing some of that color contrast and brightness of your document, that actually helps people with certain vision problems.

Or if you have light sensitivity, you know, even temporary disability from someone who's been staring at a screen all day long and experiencing eyestrain.

00:11:03 Ali

These are just.

00:11:04 Ali

Examples of way that we're trying to design our products to actually be more helpful for our users and usable for every.

One, and that's also why I love Dark mode, because it's a great example of a feature that could be specifically for a target group of users with eye problems, except that it actually applies to everyone, showing that inclusive design can just make the product more enjoyable all around.

That's a great, a great point.

00:11:28 Dewayne

Our educators are very, very aware of accessibility when they author papers and documents and publications and things like that.

00:11:38 Dewayne

And so out of curiosity, I'm just.

00:11:41 Dewayne

Just curious is it does the way you?

00:11:45 Dewayne

View your document if you're operating in dark.

00:11:49 Dewayne

Blind you in any way to accessibility things that you might want to think of on behalf of someone else who's consuming the document, like does the accessibility checker like take that into consideration or anything?

00:11:59 Dewayne

Anything interesting there?

00:12:01 Ali

Yeah, that's a great question.

00:12:03 Ali

I think one thing to note is that in dark mode you are not guaranteeing that your other collaborators are also in dark mode.

00:12:10 Ali

It's a user specific view.

00:12:12 Ali

And so if you ever.

00:12:13 Ali

Want to check how something is going to look when you share it with someone else?

00:12:16 Ali

Or if you're going to print this out on paper?

00:12:18 Ali

You should either use the switch modes button, which will just flip your page color back to white, or you should exit dark mode entirely, really just changing the page colors.

00:12:27 Ali

All you have to do to check what does that white document.

00:12:30 Ali

Still look like.

00:12:32 Ali

Because you know you want to make sure that something still looks good for your collaborator, or if you are printing on paper despite the questions on Twitter, you don't need black paper to print in dark mode.

But back to your question about the accessibility checker, which is another awesome feature on word.

00:12:49 Ali

For those who aren't familiar, the accessibility checker is a tool that is offered in app for word, and what it does is it runs through your document and flags accessibility issues that might make your content difficult to consume for someone else.

This is just like spell check, except it's a different set of rules.

00:13:07 Ali

Things like looking for.

00:13:08 Ali

All text on your images or making sure your color contrast is sufficient for people to be able to read your.

00:13:14 Ali

Content looking for, you know, tables with complex structure that might be difficult to navigate for a keyboard or screen reader user.

00:13:22 Ali

There's a variety of different rules there that I'd encourage people to go check out, but in terms of dark mode, the accessibility checker is running on the what we refer to as like the server version of the document.

So it's the.

00:13:35 Ali

The true docx file.

00:13:37 Ali

Again, dark mode is just a view that we build on top of that document.

00:13:41 Ali

So anything in the accessibility checker is looking at the real colors of your document.

00:13:45 Ali

So if your page color was white, we'll be checking color contrasts against that against that white background.

00:13:52 Ali

However, when we do map your content to dark mode, we should be maintaining.

00:13:56 Ali

The same minimum accessible color contrast requirements.

00:14:00 Ali

And so when we convert that document to dark mode, hopefully everything should still remain, you know, correct color contrast for people to read.

That's really good.

00:14:09 Dewayne

I'm glad that you kind of clarified that a little bit, 'cause.

00:14:12 Dewayne

I could see that probably tripping up some.

00:14:15 Dewayne

Some non-technical folks that that might think like like you said jokingly but maybe somebody did say it. Seriously, do I need black paper now for my printer which I?

Yeah, it can be a real a real question, and I think these these new features can definitely be confusing at times when you're really used to one way of doing things.

Think is hilarious.

00:14:33 Ali

But I think that's a lot of the beauty of word is that you have this one document, and that's consistent everywhere.

00:14:39 Ali

And then users really can customize their views whether they want to.

00:14:42 Ali

Be in print.

00:14:43 Ali

Layout or dark mode or you know be in web view with their text size larger and you can really customize your editing and consumption experience, however is easiest for you.

Personally to like consume that document.

00:14:57 Dewayne

Joe and I were at a conference a while back and we it was a it nerd kind of gathering and there was some classes that were being offered that were outside of our normal scope of something we would participate in and we wanted to do something different.

And one of them was a class on authoring accessible documents.

00:15:16 Dewayne

In Microsoft Word and there was a wonderful video that they played that showed the difference between how a screen reader would interpret a document if you hadn't properly gone in and set the sequence.

You know, use the right syntax I guess, to tell the screen reader what to read 1st, and it was a.

00:15:35 Dewayne

Eye opening your opening experience to to hear how that works, and so if if anybody who's listening hasn't played with the accessibility checker, definitely, definitely give it a look 'cause.

It is very helpful.

00:15:49 Ali

Yeah, I think a useful statistic there is that, like one in five people have a disability whether it's visible or not.

And so people often don't realize how important making your content accessible is, because you might not even realize that people you're collaborating with have some sort of disability.

And so if you can just add.

In one extra step.

00:16:09 Ali

To your workflow.

00:16:10 Ali

That's super useful.

00:16:12 Ali

I know outlook now also has a feature where individual people can say they prefer accessible.

Content and that will actually prompt someone before sending an e-mail.

00:16:20 Ali

You might get this little popup that says, hey, someone on this recipient list prefers accessible content.

00:16:25 Ali

Run the accessibility checker, because that same accessibility checker is offered in outlook with a lot of the same rules and requirements that we have in Word.

That's really, that's really cool.

00:16:35 Dewayne

I didn't know.

00:16:36 Dewayne

I I didn't know that was the thing you could opt into.

00:16:39 Dewayne

That's awesome.

00:16:41 Dewayne

I do know that.

Funny enough, in our organization we have a little banner that gets forced onto any e-mail that comes from an external source.

And that banner text is super bright, like red.

And sometimes when I reply to emails, I get an alert from Outlook that says I might want a second second, you know, look at my document to make sure it's accessible and it's because of.

Getting forced injected into the e-mail. 00:17:11 Joe So that you're supposed to actually read and look at and pay. 00:17:14 Ali Attention to but yeah, seems like someone needs to redesign the colors on that. 00:17:16 Joe Not great color. 00:17:19 Dewayne Yeah, yeah, I totally agree. 00:17:23 Joe Are some of these making their way into mobile apps? 00:17:27 Joe A lot of our agents will be definitely on the road often, and you know they'll be using office mobile or maybe an iPad. 00:17:34 Joe Some of the like dark mode and accessibility features beneby. 00:17:37 Ali Yeah, dark mode is definitely coming to the mobile apps. 00:17:41 Ali That's something we're working on for iOS and Android right now. 00:17:45 Dewayne It is. 00:17:46 Dewayne

It's interesting to see the dark mode and I, you know, obviously the whole episode is not gonna be about

dark mode, but it's interesting to see the dark mode.

That stupid banner that's.

Level is working on my Android phone.

You can choose from so often when we're actually starting to roll out dark mode from an engineering perspective.

It's easier to change all of the theming for those.

Ribbon menu item controls, and then it just takes additional time and funding for us to figure out.

You know the algorithm to map the user content because you know every user in dark mode is going to have the same exact color for their file menu.

But your document is, you know, totally unique to. 00:18:52 Ali It's your own document. 00:18:53 Ali So doing the work to make sure those. 00:18:55 Ali Colors can invert and flip that page. 00:18:58 Ali Colors takes a little bit longer, but that's what you're seeing on Android is you're seeing basically half of the feature released right now with the Dark menu controls, and soon the dark page color will follow. 00:19:08 Dewayne My battery will thank you. 00:19:11 Dewayne So is that true, Joe, like it is? 00:19:14 Dewayne Does it require less energy I guess for a phone to like not display a color? 00:19:19 Dewayne I guess like are certain colors more optimal? 00:19:23 Joe I mean, I think that what I've read is there's some energy, less energy, you know, not having to push out a. 00:19:29 Joe A bright screen. 00:19:30 Joe So reducing that might be interesting to just take, you know, all computers across the planet. 00:19:34 Joe Dark mode? 00:19:35 Joe What would we how many plus carbon units would be saving?

But there's actually a completely free version of Office that exists only. 00:21:27 Dewayne In the web. 00:21:28 Dewayne And you have a lot to do with that too. 00:21:30 Dewayne And there are some. 00:21:32 Dewayne Difference is obviously it's running in a web browser, but. 00:21:36 Joe What're what're a? 00:21:37 Dewayne Few of your favorite things that you can only get in the web. 00:21:40 Dewayne And is there anything extra interesting you want to say about the web 'cause? 00:21:44 Dewayne A lot of people don't even know it's there. 00:21:46 Ali Yeah, I'm office online or you know, word online. 00:21:49 Ali Word for the web. 00:21:50 Ali There's a few different names for it. 00:21:52 Ali It really is just a version of word in your browser tab, but so many people don't know about it. 00:21:57 Ali My own younger brother needed to access. 00:22:00 Ali

This you know his word files and he couldn't get it from the desktop and I was able to tell him, hey, you can actually go to office.com and you can upload your file there and then you can open it in Word, totally free without an account.

But yeah, office online is totally free and which is super awesome 'cause.

I know a lot of people, you know when they leave school or when their license expires, they get those annoying prompts on their desktop and they can't open those files anymore.

But you know, if that file is saved to the cloud, like save to a OneDrive account which is also free, you can go in and open that.

File on the web and then you know, collaboration, seeing real time typing all of.

That stuff will work there.

In terms of features that I really like that are in Word web only right now, one of them is transcribe.

This is a super cool feature where you can actually upload an audio file and word will parse out all of the words in that audio file and put them into a Word document for you.

Whether you have you know a meeting, recording, or you just want to know the lyrics of the new song that you've been listening to, you can see what word thing.

We use transcribe every single time we do a podcast recording. We use word online to transcribe the the final MP3 so that we can upload a PDF file alongside the episode so if anybody out there has ever looked at.

Don't know if anybody has, but if anybody has ever looked at our show notes and looked at the transcription to try to hunt something that we said that was all powered by word online.

One of my favorites, and so times two there.

I think on that same topic of other features I love that are only in the web right now, there's a feature called comment reactions, which is also something I've worked on.

Pretty basic idea is just, you know, we added a like button to comments, but now it's so much easier for me.

You know, I never ever ever ever many errors later want to paste text and keep source formatting in Word and that actually is our default paste option on desktop word.

And that's as I mentioned, you know, if you go and copy a, you know, headline from a Wikipedia article or a news article or something and you paste it.

Into word, the default option is to try to make it look exactly how it looked on that website.

And I think that really is not most users intentions.

They want to take the content of something that they had to copy or, you know, something they didn't know how to spell that they looked up and copied and want to paste it in, and they don't want it to look like it came from their Internet browser.

They want to look like it's typed next to all of their other words in their document, and so that was an.

An attempt like the control shift key shortcut and web adds this option for users.

I am on a longer mission to revisit the default paste options on desktop and that can take a little bit longer just because we have so many users on desktop.

That's something I actually love about working on word for the web.

'cause it really is a more experimental playground in my mind of users who have opted into a more modern experience.

They're on the web browser, so we can actually, we can change their experience every day in terms of the way.

Formatting or how to go in and adjust exactly what that font looks like?

That's like I'm typing in my document and instead I'm going to speak and those words will be recorded

into the document.

Yeah, the next level of that would be, you know, can I press the bold button with my voice?
